Sr Elham is an amazing woman, she holds incredible strength, always embraces goodness, and understands everyone with defined grace.






July 2 to July 9, 2023

Youssef was a farmer in Lebanon and worked in many factories in Australia.


Youssef is of the Maronite Catholic religious belief and continues to attend mass weekly here at the Maronite Sisters Village.






Village 1 Redevelopment - New Aged Care Centre September 2023

The second phase of Design Development has commenced with the architects developing more detailed floor plans. The buildings 'design brief' is also being developed through several design meetings with Sr Elham, Sr Clara and Sr Louise and the Advisory Board members.

The buildings design brief and operational relationships are all being considered by the architects.

The CGI Aerial image below illustrates how the proposed building is positioned between the existing trees around the site's boundary.



An arborist has completed a detailed survey to determine the extent of the trees likely root systems and extent of proposed development. Many of trees may be close to 100 years old.

The current design provides six self-contained 'houses', with between 15-22 residents per household giving a total of around 100 residents.

Each 'house' has its own Living Room, Dining Room, Servery Kitchen and necessary support spaces plus single resident rooms with their own ensuites.

Where possible Back of House (BOH) support areas and service corridors are separate and not shared with the public, resident, or family areas.

The buildings appearance is also starting to emerge. Following is an early image developed by the architects of the front entry foyer and chapel.



In the next stage of Design Development, a number of specialist services engineers will be commissioned to review the design and provide advice on the required spaces for Plant Rooms, Service Ducts, Distribution Boards, etc.

Coming up... 14th October **Referendum 2023**

Referendum FAQS

The 2023 Australian Indigenous Voice referendum will ask voters to approve an alteration to the Australian Constitution, creating a body called the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Voice that "may make representations to the Parliament and the Executive Government on matters relating to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples.

When it will be held:

The referendum, prepared by the National Indigenous Australians Agency and conducted by the Australian Electoral Commission.; It Must occur between 16 September 2023 and 16 December 2023.

Prime Minister Anthony Albanese has indicated that the referendum will be held October 14th, 2023. Under Australian law, all elections or referendums must be held on a Saturday and must occur between two and six months after the relevant Bill passed both chambers of parliament, which was 19 June 2023.

Is the referendum compulsory in Australia 2023?

Yes. It is compulsory by law for all eligible Australian citizens aged 18 and over to enrol and vote in referendums and federal elections. If you are already on the electoral roll for federal elections, you DO NOT need to enrol again to vote in a referendum.
